Historic Carversville Society Scholarship

For many years, the Historic Society has been presenting at least one, if not several scholarships to a graduating senior from the New Hope-Solebury High School. Over the past two years, despite the pandemic, we have been able to hold interviews over zoom and choose candidates for these awards.

This award is presented to a student or students going on for further education, who have shown civic involvement, historic concern and/or have been involved in community volunteer work. Applications are submitted through the New Hope-Solebury High School Guidance Department and are reviewed by the Historic Society each spring.

For the Senior Class of 2020, we gave the scholarship to **Ryan Viehweger**, who was raised here in Carversville. We were so pleased to be able to present it to him. Ryan is currently at the University of Colorado in Boulder as a Sophomore. He spent his growing up years helping with all Carversville events and activities- Clean-up days, Pumpkin carving, Films in The Field, Carversville Day and more, and has shown a real love and concern for this community. His business, "The Carversville Cutting Crew" was such a presence in Carversville for mowing, clean-up, and snow removal, but unfortunately had to shut down with him being in school.

Last year for the Senior Class of 2021, we chose 5 students, but our 1st choice, **Erin Firth** ended up going to Air Force Academy, so we gave her a small token. Additionally, we gave scholarships to: **Grace Hanley**, going to University of North Carolina and volunteering at Fisherman's Mark, and the library among other places; **Morgan Miele**, going to Ithaca College, who was an EMT for the New Hope-Lambertville Rescue Squad; **Davis Nagg**, a Jr. Firefighter for NH-Lambertville Squad, and an Eagle Scout; and **An Binh Tran**, who studied at Middle Bucks Institute of Technology while in HS, volunteering at Bowmans Hill and the playhouse, and going to the University of Pittsburgh.

It always feels good to support these young people in the hopes that they will continue to volunteer as they grow older. This is one of the many areas that we as a Historic Society are proud to be able to sponsor. On September 1, 2021 the remnants of Hurricane Ida unleashed a flash flood in our area rivaling the impact of the legendary flood of 1955 that tore up the Carversville village square dislodging the gas pumps and tearing the top off the stone bridge leading into the village. Unlike 1955 and subsequent major flood events such as Hurricanes Floyd, Irene, and Tropical Storm Lee, towns along the river including Lumberville were largely spared from major river flooding. It was the creeks and streams that inundated our communities. Especially hard hit in our area were Carversville and Lambertville, NJ.

In Carversville the three forks of the Paunacussing Creek, which converge at the village, were all overwhelmed as rainfall estimated in the 8"-10" range hit dead center. Over the course of only 20-30 minutes between 6 and 6:30 pm the streams burst their banks and the North Fork, for example, which runs along Carversville Road, became a 3-5 foot deep river 100 feet wide. The culvert under Wismer Road was wholly inadequate to handle this torrent of water that carried not only logs and personal possessions, but hundreds of tons of rock and stone from the surrounding hillsides. It is estimated that the flood waters rages for at least 2 to 3 hours.

The homes located near the lowest point in Carversville, close to the intersection of Carversville Rd. and Wismer Rd., were all flooded. Eerily the power stayed on throughout the flooding and 2nd floor silhouettes of 103 year old Brenda Meredith and Dave Linehan's homes were among the last images of these long time residents, who following the storm left the community to find other residences.

Of the commercial buildings in the village center, the General Store, which had been closed for an extended period due to the pandemic, and the post office, took on water up to the windowsills. Remarkably, although the combined South Forks of the Paunacussing were splashing over the sidings of the Carversville Rd. stone bridge, Dr. Barsky's dental office and the closed-for-renovation Carversville Inn building suffered relatively little damage, especially compared to the residences on the other side of that bridge.

Water rescue boats active in Carversville did not fare well, one ending the night nestled against the side of one of these severely impacted residences. The feeder lines from at least two liquid propane gas tanks were ruptured as the storms dislodged the tanks sending clouds of gas skyward into the rain.

A walk through the village early the next morning revealed the extent of the destruction with roadways torn apart by fast moving floodwaters and massive deposits of rock, stone, and other debris. Residents below the Village on Fleecydale Rd. also suffered the wrath of the surging Paunacussing Creek, with more water and debris cascading down the valley walls.

At daybreak, we came upon an unidentified woman returning to her car that was still parked on the hump of the stone bridge on Fleecydale. Despite being caught in dangerously high waters throughout her journey home the night before, her car started right up the next morning! The returning driver described 4 hours of being stranded on the bridge in horror watching debris including other cars being swept downstream. She recounted her gratitude for the local rescue authorities and their several failed attempts at her water rescue before finally being saved from the swollen river that had filled the valley.

More broadly, along the valley wall leading down to the Delaware River, every stream and rivulet from Point Pleasant down past New Hope became a fast moving torrent carrying tons of debris and tearing up every paved road leading down to the river. River Road suffered serious damage both north and south of Lumberville, which itself was only accessible for a time via the pedestrian bridge over the river. Interestingly the unpaved sections of these same roads suffered far less damage.

The spontaneous and generous community effort to assist the worst effected homeowners quickly began and continued for many long days that followed. This is one of the many reasons we love Carversville. – Robert and Kathy Stein, Carversville residents since 1991
